MIDWEEK LENTEN SERVICES

Once again, we will join other local congregations for supper and worship on Wednesday evenings during Lent. We begin with a simple meal of soup and sandwiches at 6:00 p.m., followed by worship at 6:45. We will host the first one on March 8th. Pastor John Apple and Lynn Hunsicker will deliver a dialogue sermon focusing on betrayal.

The theme this year is "At the Crossroads." Many of those involved in the story of the Passion of Christ came to a crossroads and had to decide which way to go. Each service will reveal in some way how Christ and his cross also lead <u>us</u> to decide the path of God's will for us.

The other participating congregations are First Faith Community, First Presbyterian, Grace Episcopal, The Community at Parkvue, St. Stephen United Church of Christ, and Trinity United Methodist.

The offering will benefit a mission project of each of the hosting churches. For us that will be our Center for Peace & Understanding.

Shortly after Christmas I saw a sign at one of the local grocery stores that said, "It's Paczki Time!" It was sitting on top of a table in the bakery department with boxes of that Polish pastry resembling jelly doughnuts. I reacted with the same disgust I have when I see a store displaying Christmas decorations before Halloween. Obviously the store, and most consumers, have no idea what the paczki tradition is all about. There is no "Paczki Time," there is only Paczki <u>Day</u>, and it

doesn't arrive until Fat Tuesday, this year on February 28th.

Fat Tuesday is the day before Lent begins. In centuries past, the use of milk, cheese, butter, eggs, and animal fats during the days of Lent was forbidden by religious customs. So all of those items needed to be used up before the Lenten fast began. Various Christian nations developed their own rich breads and desserts for one last feast before the austerity of Lent. In Poland they created packzi. The Germans made fastnachts. In Great Britain pancakes served the same purpose. For the obvious reason then, the day before Lent began (Ash Wednesday) became known as Fat Tuesday.

Lent itself, the 40-day period between Ash Wednesday and Easter (excluding Sundays), has its roots in the early church and emerged from an extensive period of prayer and fasting that took place in preparation for the baptism of new Christians on Easter morning.

Today Lent is a time of introspection and reflection as we prepare our hearts and minds for Easter. It's about improving our relationship with God by looking deep inside ourselves to see the ways we hurt one another and our world by not living as God intends, and then making necessary changes.

So, in keeping with tradition, I hope you will enjoy some goodies on Fat Tuesday and then take a serious approach to Lent by participating in our own unique Ash Wednesday service and the joint midweek Lenten services with other local congregations *(see the schedule on the back cover.)*

If you would like a devotional to help you focus your introspective thoughts during Lent, a variety of them are available on the back table in the sanctuary.

ONE GREAT HOUR OF SHARING March 26th

One Great

Just as you did it to the one of least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me. (Matthew 25:40)

OF SHARING Paul's letters remind us that as members of the church, we are so closely connected that we can think of ourselves as parts of one body. The New Testament constantly refers to followers of Jesus, not as Christians, but as a *family*—brothers and sisters.

Many churches live this out when someone is ill, mourning, or facing a crisis. You show up. You are there for your loved ones in need. You show that love in tangible ways, with casseroles and cards, hugs, and spoken words of prayer. These acts of kindness let your brothers and sisters in Christ know that you are present with them. They know they are not alone because you are beside them. They know that they are not forgotten in their times of trouble. When someone you care about suffers—all your truest words and most loving actions simply declare: "I am here."

The Bible tells us that God is like us in this respect. When one of God's beloved children suffers, God declares, "I am here." God hears the cries of the poor and oppressed (Exodus 3:9, Psalm 10:17, 69:33), is near to the brokenhearted (Psalm 34:18), and is near to all who call God's name (Psalm 145:18). The promise that God will be with us is a constant refrain from Genesis to Revelation.

When Jesus tells the parable of the sheep and the goats (Matthew 25:31-40), he reveals to us a mystery. God is most tangibly present in this world where people hunger, thirst, lack adequate clothing and shelter, and are sick or imprisoned. Christ cares for people who suffer and says He is *so* present in them that when you feed the hungry, care for the sick, welcome the stranger— you feed, and care for, and welcome Christ.

Not just your fellow Christians, but anyone in need, anywhere in the world—these are your sisters, your brothers, your children. Their needs might seem different than the people you worship with on Sunday, but your tangible gifts declare the same message: "I am here." By reaching out to those who suffer from natural disasters, war, or systemic poverty, you let them know that they are not forgotten. By acting together as the body of Christ, we are able to be there for members of Christ's family.

We are there through providing well pumps for clean water, seeds and training for sustainable agriculture, and rice and oil to provide nourishment and cooking supplies. We are there through medical kits, school supplies, temporary shelters, and safe housing projects where needed most. One Great Hour of Sharing donations fund these efforts. We will be taking the One Great Hour of Sharing special collection on March 26th. An envelope is included with this newsletter - please give generously.
