WELCOME BAHADIR & CEM!



Since our retreat last fall, and signing the Charter for Compassion, we have focused a lot of attention on peace and understanding.

Offering a course on loving our Muslim neighbors helped several members of the community gain a new understanding of Islam and we gained a wonderful friendship with Ali & Rihab Salhieh. Establishing a relationship with two foreign INISTER students working at Kalahari for the summer is also helping us gain understanding of a different culture as well as giving us an opportunity to spread peace on an

international level. It's all about hospitality, or "love of the stranger," as it is known in the New Testament.

One of the Study Group sessions on peace this spring challenged us to think about who in our community are the strangers we fail to offer hospitality. For me that was easy. Since moving to Sandusky 21 years ago, I have been very aware of the negative feelings many residents have for the tourists.

I hear all kinds of grumbling about the traffic problems, crowded restaurants and long lines at stores. The worst comment was one I overheard last week at a crowded local coffee shop. "I don't call them tourists," an irritated man said to the person next to him, "I call them terrorists." He probably thought he was being funny. I thought he was obnoxious and insensitive. First of all, terrorism is nothing to joke about. Secondly, tourists aren't here to do harm, in fact, they help our local economy by spending money and creating the need for jobs. We should be thanking them, not condemning them. Where would Sandusky be without tourism?

We're heading into the busiest time of "the season." As we continue our work of peace and understanding, I encourage all of us to show more compassion and hospitality to the men, women and children who come here to enjoy our area's attractions.

Sooner or later, we all become tourists when we travel here or abroad. When it's your turn to be the visitor, how do you hope to be treated by the local people?

In the weeks ahead, please remember the Golden Rule and "do unto others as you would have them do unto you." Also, don't forget what it says in Hebrews 13:2: Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing that some have entertained angels without knowing it.



MOVIE NIGHT




The movie for July 18th will be the David Butler romp Ali Baba Goes to Town

AIR CONDITIONING FUND UPDATE

If all the pledges are fulfilled, we still have just over \$4000 to go to reach our goal of \$61,693 (the total amount borrowed from the endowment fund).
