Several people have asked me what I think about the Religious Liberty Executive Order recently signed by the President. To be honest, I don't know all the details, but it appears that pastors will now be free to preach about politics and encourage their congregations to vote for certain candidates without fear of the church losing its tax-exempt status.

No matter what the order says, it won't make any difference to my ministry here at First Congregational. Other than encouraging members to exercise their

right to vote, I have always tried to keep politics out of the pulpit, and plan to continue doing so.

I wasn't called to the church to push a political agenda or endorse candidates from a particular political party. My training is in theology, not political science. I was called to preach the Gospel and to help us all find guidance in scripture for making the decisions in life we are faced with every day, including political ones.

Years ago, after preaching a sermon involving environmental issues, a very irate member told me "that environment stuff is political, not religious. You shouldn't be talking about it." I quickly reminded him that according to Genesis 2:15 we are to be "care takers" of the earth.

Some of you today might also think I'm talking politics when I preach about justice issues and Jesus commanding us to "love one another" and to take care of "the least of these." Once again, that is scripturally sound and not based on the agenda of any political party.

It is true that in my private life, away from the church, I <u>am</u> politically active. I belong to a couple of political groups and voice my opinions as an activist for human rights and environmental issues. I sign petitions, contact lawmakers, attend rallies and join marches. But I would never try to force my opinions on the congregation, or tell you that God wants you to vote for a candidate that supports them. That would be an abuse of power, pastoral malpractice some have called it.

Just like me, prior to voting, you have to draw your own conclusions, based on <u>your</u> faith perspective and all the information available to you. Sometimes that's easy, other times seemingly impossible, but at all times, necessary.

We will meet on Friday, June 2nd to discuss *The Storyteller* by Jodi Picoult. At that time the book for July, *All the Light We Cannot See* by Anthony Doerr, will be distributed. Doerr tells the tale of a blind French girl and a German boy whose paths collide in occupied France as both try to survive the devastation of World War II.

Marie-Laure lives with her father in Paris near the Museum of Natural History, where he works as the master of its thousands of locks. When she is twelve, the Nazis occupy Paris and father and daughter flee to the walled citadel of Saint-Malo, where Marie-Laure's reclusive great-uncle lives in a tall house by the sea. With them they carry what might be the museum's most valuable and dangerous jewel.

In a mining town in Germany, the orphan Werner grows up with his younger sister, enchanted by a crude radio they find. Werner becomes an expert at building and fixing these crucial new instruments, a talent that wins him a place at a brutal academy for Hitler Youth, then a special assignment to track the resistance. More and more aware of the human cost of his intelligence, Werner travels through the heart of the war and, finally, into Saint-Malo, where his story and Marie-Laure's

converge.





Supper Club will meet at Danny Boy's on Tuesday, June 6th at 6:00 p.m.. Reservations are required - please sign up on the back bulletin board.
