Journey to Generosity

The Way of Jesus Matthew 9:35-10:23



Veterans Day will soon be here. I have always considered it to be a day to honor the brave men and women who have served in our military. Thanks to Skip Oliver and the Veterans For Peace, I am approaching it with new insight this year.

Veterans for Peace was founded in 1985 by ten U.S. veterans in response to the global nuclear arms race and U.S. military interventions in Central America. The organization rapidly grew to more than 8,000 members in the buildup to the U.S. invasion of Iraq in 2003.

Today Veterans For Peace has veteran and associate members in every U.S. state and several countries. Members actively work to prevent the spread of militarism in our society, change U.S. foreign policy from endless war to diplomacy and to help our national leaders have a long term vision of peace and justice. They believe one of the most important components to ending war is to work for peace.

Long before it was known as Veterans Day, November 11th was designated as Armistice Day by an act of Congress in 1926 "to perpetuate peace through good will and mutual understanding between nations, (and later) a day dedicated to the cause of world peace." As part of that, many churches rang their bells on the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month - the hour in 1918 that guns fell silent on the Western Front by which time 16 million had died in the horror of World War I.

In 1954 the day was changed to Veterans Day and its original focus on international peace soon forgotten. According to Skip, "Veterans Day has devolved into a hyper-nationalistic quasi-religious celebration of war and the putatively valiant warriors who wage it."

This year, on November 11th, Veterans For Peace will bring back the original Armistice Day traditions and are asking churches to ring their bells at 11:00 a.m.. So, I will be ringing our bell that day at the appointed time. As I do, I hope you will join me in saying a prayer for peace.

If you would like someone else included, please let Rev. Lenore know by November 4^{th} .


From Kim Nemeth...

WE ARE STEWARDS OF FORGIVENESS

"Then Peter came and said to him, 'Lord, if another member of the church sins against me, how often should I forgive? As many as seven times?' Jesus said to him, 'Not seven times, but, I tell you, seventy-seven times."

ur text today centers around forgiveness. When we think about forgiveness in the church, we probably first think about God forgiving us. And that is the foundation of all other forgiveness. But our text focuses on forgiving one another, particularly when someone has done something to violate you or to violate community.

When something is unforgiven, it stands like a roadblock between two people, between a person and community, or between communities. Only when it is removed can each party fully give to the relationship and receive from the relationship and engage in the mutual support that should characterize true community.

We are stewards of our time, talent, money, and other resources. We are stewards of forgiveness. We are stewards of possibility for individuals, households, and larger communities.

When we use our resources to support the church, we vote for a world in which we put the roadblocks aside and replace them with the free flow of traffic in real community.
