GRANT RECEIVED FOR PEACE WORK

Thanks to Bob Bottoms applying for a grant from the UCC Make A Difference Fund on behalf of the Center for Peace & Understanding, we received \$1600 for an upcoming project we plan to sponsor with the Sandusky Library.

It probably won't happen until 2019, but we are working together to bring an exhibit, "Anne Frank: A History for Today" from the Anne Frank Center for Mutual Respect to Sandusky. It is hoped that the exhibit will lead to further discussion around the ways in which disharmony and misunderstanding between racial and ethnic groups in our community can be diminished through opportunities for dialogue, sharing and education.


More funding will be needed as the cost of the exhibit is \$3500-\$9000, depending on the size of the display. The Library will be in contact with the Lange Trust to hopefully share in the financial support.

The Book Club will be discussing *A Man Called Ove* when they gather Friday, January 5th. At that time the book for February will be distributed, *Dead Wake* by Erik Lawson.

It is the story of the sinking of the Lusitania, one that many of us think we know, but don't because the intimate details and true meaning of this great disaster have long been obscured by history.

Full of glamour and suspense, *Dead Wake* brings to life a cast of evocative characters, from famed Boston bookseller Charles Lauriat to pioneering female architect Theodate Pope to President Woodrow Wilson, a man lost to grief, dreading the widening war but also captivated by the prospect of new love.



JANUARY 30th BOOK DISCUSSION

America's Original Sin: Racism, White Privilege and the Bridge to a New America

In an on-going effort to increase awareness and understanding throughout the community of issues related to peace, our Center for Peace & Understanding is partnering with the Library to host a discussion of Jim Wallis's book *America's Original Sin: Racism, White Privilege and the Bridge to a New America*. It will be held Tuesday, January 30th at 6:00 p.m. at the Library and co-led by our own Rev. Bob Bottoms and Jennifer Ashburn.

Wallis, a bestselling author and leading Christian activist, offers a prophetic and deeply personal call to action in overcoming the racism that is so ingrained in American society. He speaks candidly to Christians--particularly white Christians--urging them to cross a new bridge toward racial justice and healing. Probing yet positive, biblically rooted yet highly practical, this book shows people of faith how they can work together to overcome the embedded racism in America, galvanizing a movement to cross the bridge to a multiracial church and a new America.
