I hope you join me in taking pride in the fact that our little congregation is demonstrating to the community that we believe being the church today is about more than getting butts in the pew, or telling others how they should live their lives. Personally, I am most proud that we are doing our best to challenge the ridiculous narrative that has been circulating the past couple of years that says immigrants are bad people who threaten our lives and want to take our jobs. Such a tale has done nothing but increase hate and violence all around the country.

That reminds me of the motto for this year's NAACP Freedom Fund Banquet, "Defeat Hate - VOTE." This is a very important election coming up so I hope you are registered. If not, you have until October 9th to do so. Forms are available in the church office. Then, starting October 10th, make sure you vote. The times the Board of Elections will be open for early voting will be posted in the Sunday announcements each week through November 4th.

NEIGHBORS IN NEED

The Neighbors in Need offering will be collected Sunday, October 28th, to support the UCC ministries of justice and compassion throughout the United States. An envelopes are available of the back tables in the sanctuary. Two-thirds of the offering is used by the UCC's Justice and Witness Ministries to fund a wide array of local and national justice initiatives, advocacy efforts and direct service projects. Our national Justice and Witness Ministries office offers resources, news updates and action alerts on a broad spectrum of justice issues. Working with members of the UCC Justice and Peace Action Network, Justice and Witness continues its strong policy advocacy work on issues such as the federal budget, voting rights, immigration, health care, hate crimes, civil liberties and environmental justice.

Neighbors in Need also supports our American Indian neighbors in the UCC. One-third of this offering supports the UCC's Council for American Indian Ministries. Historically, forebearers of the UCC established churches and worked with Lakota, Dakota, Nakota, Mandan, Hidatsa, Arickara and Hocak in North and South Dakota, Wisconsin and northern Nebraska. Today their are 20 UCC congregations on reservations and one urban, multi-cultural UCC congregation in Minneapolis, Minnesota. These churches and their pastors are supported by CAIM. CAIM is also an invaluable resource for more than 1,000 individuals from dozens of other tribes and nations who are members of other UCC congregations in the U.S.
