Instead, with great excitement she proceeded to tell me about something she had just witnessed on her way to the gym. In the early morning darkness a single ray of sun light shown over the tops of a group of trees, highlighting their beautiful autumn colors with such brilliance she and her friend were left totally in awe. "I'm sure it was a message, a sign," she said, "and I knew I had to tell you."

Now you can think whatever you want, but to me this was a "God thing" and exactly what you and I need these days, a reminder that our Creator God is with us in the midst of all that is going on. The woman's insistence on sharing her experience with me is also a reminder. We have the care and support of one another as we try to cope with the daily bombardment of bad news. Friends, family, fellow church members and even gym buddies are here to help us through these difficult days.

In this season of Thanksgiving, let's be sure to give thanks for the embrace of loved ones, compassion of friends, smiles from strangers and all the magnificent signs of God's presence in the natural world.




