CWS distributed thousands of blankets around the world in 2018. Last year we collected \$336. We hope to have an even greater response this year with the offering that will be taken on May 12th. Envelopes are available on the back tables in the sanctuary. If you won't be in church that day, you may donate anytime throughout the month.

MUSIC

As our choir and musicians are busy preparing for our Anniversary Service on May 19th, I'll give a brief overview of the music our congregation has experienced over our 200-year history.

Over the past 15 years

In 2004 Marianne Webb was the director of our small choir. When she resigned two years later the choir decided it was not cost effective to hire a replacement. With assistance from our organist, Charles Scroggy, they have led themselves with Barb Petersen being their chief organizer and motivator. The choir has done an excellent job even though at times there have only been three or four of them singing. There usually wasn't enough of them available for a performance during the holidays. Then last year, with three of our new members and Robin Pratt joining them, their number increased to ten, and this Easter, for the first time in recent history, they were all here to sing. It was beautiful!



In July of 2009 we were honored to host a concert as part of the Organ Historical Society's annual convention in Cleveland. Over 500 organ enthusiasts from all over the world filled our sanctuary for this amazing event.



The year 2009 was also memorable because, unknown to us at the time, our music program was about to change in a dramatic way when our piano tuner, Robin Pratt, became a member of our church family. At first he just played the piano occasionally. Then every once in awhile, much to the congregation's delight, he and Charles would play a duet. A couple years later Robin was hired on the staff and we hear incredible duets almost every Sunday. Their music is so appreciated that, unlike in most churches where everyone exits

during the postlude, almost all our folks sit down and listen to it. A few even linger to hear them practice for the next week. It's no wonder then that funds were quickly raised in 2012 when Robin suggested we purchase a new piano.

Since 1819

Music in the early days was provided by a member named Frank Parish. He played several instruments, his favorite being a "bull fiddle." Frank was a pillar member of the church. You will hear more about him later in the year when I highlight our most memorable members.

The first choir wasn't organized until 16 years after the congregation was founded. That's when our first building was constructed and our first resident pastor hired. Rev. Alan Nash (1836-1838) felt strongly that a choir was necessary to supplement and contribute vitality to each worship service. In addition to starting the choir, records indicate he also established a singing school, but I wasn't able to find any details about the school.

When Rev. Nash resigned Rev. Ichabod Hart (1838-1844) was hired. He also believed wholeheartedly in inspiring music and a strong church choir. He worked hard to support both and that may have been why an assistant pastor, Mr. Clapp, was hired to direct the choir and singing school. Later, when the decision was made to replace the extremely popular Mr. Clapp with a "hot shot" director from Boston, Rev. Hart tried to smooth over the awkward situation.

It appears that controversy in the choir was not uncommon back in the early days. A man named

Bill West joined the church a few years after Parish. Apparently, he had a remarkable "New England trained voice" and was able to sing either tenor or bass, "top to bottom, with gusto." For a time, when there was no choir director, he and Parish led the choir. There was no piano at the time so he was the one to keep the choir on pitch. A few years later he had a huge disagreement with the choir director and left our choir to join the one at Grace Episcopal Church. However, he also remained an active member here at First Congregational.

By the early 1900's things had settled down in the choir and they proudly declared they were a "self-sustaining" choir. They held concerts to raise funds to cover their expenses and to help purchase the new organ that was dedicated on August 22, 1917. In the dedication program it is described as "a two-manual Austin Organ with electric action, universal wind-chest, and detached console. It contains 628 speaking pipes. Of the 75 display pipes only 12 speak." It was put to good use for more than 65 years and much

of that time Carol Judson was the organist. Legend has it that she had was asked to fill in for a few weeks when the organist resigned and ending up serving in that capacity for 47 years. Carol then became a legend herself! The congregation was so appreciative of her dedication that they declared April 29, 1962 "Carol N. Judson Day." She was absolutely shocked by the afternoon concert held in her honor and attended by church members, family and friends who traveled from all around the country to celebrate with her. The concert was followed by a reception with a cake decorated to look like a pipe organ!





That same year there was also a lot of excitement in the congregation when Jackie Mayer was crowned Miss America. Her mother, Beverlie, was our choir director and Jackie herself was at our church almost every week while growing up. She came for choir and worship after attending Sunday School at First Presbyterian Church. According to Rev. Boardman in the Annual Report that year, Jackie remained unchanged. He said, "How appropriate it was that when she attended our worship service on November 4, she sang in our choir dressed in a choir robe just as the Jackie we have seen there many times before."

By the late 1970's it was obvious that it was only a matter of time before the old organ gave out. A committee was established to begin looking for a new one and in 1980 the committee's recommendation to purchase the

organ we now have was voted on and accepted. Built in 1875, it is an Opus 462 of the well-known Johnson & Son Organ Company of Westfield, Massachusetts with 23 speaking stops and 26 ranks of pipes. It was purchased through the Organ Clearing House for \$18,000. Eighteen months of restoration took place before the dismantled organ arrived at the church in two large Ryder trucks. Then piece by pipe, pipe by pipe, it was carefully rebuilt in our sanctuary and enclosed behind a facade of the old pipe organ.

The new organ was dedicated on April 18, 1982 at the 10:00 a.m. worship service with special choir and organ music being an important part of the service. The cost of the restoration and installation, including complete renovation of the choir loft, was \$51,000. Such a large project was only possible because of the congregation's love of music that motivated them to give generously of their time, talent and financial support.

That love of music is a thread that has run throughout our congregation's history. Like the pastors of long ago I also believe music, both vocal and instrumental, is necessary to enhance our worship services. It sure feeds my soul, and for that I continually give God thanks for the dedication and talent of Charles and Robin and our choir members.
