Each and every one of us who is sheltering in place is playing a vital role in flattening the COVID-19 curve. Dr. Amy Acton reminds us of this every day during the Governor's press conference.

There is something else we <u>all</u> can do. It's something we at First Congregational UCC are known for - our advocacy for the persecuted and vulnerable who live on the fringe of society. We need to stand up and be the voice for those who are being hurt the most by the pandemic. That would be those who were already living at or below the poverty level, as well as those with mental health and addiction issues. And let's not forget the elderly who are now being seen by some as disposable.

Yesterday I was made aware of another urgent need for advocacy. I received an e-mail from Kelly Choi, a Korean-American student and member of the March For Our Lives Youth Power Council. She said since the spread of COVID-19 there has been an increase in racist attacks (over 650 just last week) on Asian-Americans across the country. They are being blamed for the pandemic which their persecutors refer to as "kung flu" or the "Chinese virus." Of course this claim is inaccurate, xenophobic and harmful, even though the President himself used one of those terms several times in a press conference last week.

What can we do? Ms. Choi says, "For our non-Asian allies who want to show solidarity, lift up your voices and faces on your social media, and defend us against any racist rhetoric you may hear. Pushing back against these lies is how we can stop violence from escalating. By speaking up, you can quite literally save our lives."

This issue hits very close to home for me. My nephew is Korean. I am concerned for his safety, and equally concerned about the xenophobia in our country that is once again rearing its ugly head.

Now is the time to be globally united, not divided. Let's pray as Jesus did, "that all may be one." Shalom,

EXTENDED PRIMARY ELECTION - Tuesday, April 28, 2020

If you already voted early or voted by mail based on the original March 17th Primary Election date and returned your ballot back to the Erie County Board of Elections, there is no need to vote again. Your ballot <u>will</u> count for the Primary Election .

If you have not voted yet, be aware that with only a few exceptions, there will be NO in-person Voting. It will be done by mail.

If you previously requested your ballot by mail, received it, but have not returned it back to the Erie County Board of Elections, there are several options on how to return your ballot to be counted. See instructions below on options to return ballots.

If you have not voted yet, to vote by mail for the Primary Election - Tuesday, April 28, 2020, you MUST request and complete an Absentee Ballot Application by 12noon on Saturday, April 25, 2020. Call the Erie County Board of Elections to have an application mailed to you at 419.627.7601.

OPTIONS TO RETURN YOUR APPLICATION

Your application may be mailed to the Erie County Board of Elections, 2900 Columbus Avenue-Room 101, Sandusky, OH 44870, or dropped off into the secured drop box at the Erie County Service Building, 2900 Columbus Avenue, Sandusky. The drop box will be available 24/7 outside the building.

Once your application is processed, a ballot will be mailed to you. When filling it out remember the acceptable dates to fill in of the Extended Primary are March 17, 2020 or April 28, 2020. And don't forget to fill in the political party ballot,

OPTIONS TO RETURN YOUR BALLOT

Once you have voted your ballot may be returned by mail in the provided postage-paid envelope to the Erie County Board of Elections, 2900 Columbus Avenue, Sandusky 44870, postmarked no later than Monday, April 27, 2020, AND arrive at the Erie County Board of Elections no later than May 8, 2020.

NOTE: It is recommended that you take your ballot envelope into the Post Office to have the clerk manually postmark the envelope. If the envelope is not properly postmarked your ballot will not be counted.

NOTE: The U.S. Post Office estimates it could take 2-5 days each for applications and ballots to be mailed to voters. GIVE YOURSELF PLENTY OF TIME TO RECEIVE YOUR BALLOT!

You may also drop off your ballot in the envelopes provided into the secured drop box located outside of the Erie County Service Building,2900 Columbus Avenue, Sandusky 44870. The drop box will be available 24/7 outside the building. If you decide to dropoff your ballot, it must be received no later than 7:30pm on Tuesday, April 28, 2020.
