# OPEN FOR BUSINESS but NOT as usual

Live Stream Still Available

We are not encouraging or discouraging anyone to come to the church. For some we are an essential business so, like the grocery stores, we will be open to anyone willing to adhere to our strict safety guidelines: everyone <u>must</u> wear a mask (they will be available for anyone needing one), hands must be santized upon entering the sanctuary (remember you touched a door handle and a handrail or two elevator buttons to get to the sanctuary), and social distancing must be practiced (given the large size of our sancturay and the small size of our congregation, this can be done.) There will be no Sunday School or fellowship after the service and a new ritual will replace our traditional passing of the peace during worship.

I recently participated in an E-Forum offered by Eden Theological Seminary titled "Psalms for a Pandemic." The presenter was Dr. Clint McCann. He related a number of Psalms to the pandemic.

Several Psalms, like 91 and 46, address fear and the comfort we can find in God being our refuge and strength. Psalm 33, can respond to the misunderstanding some people have, and spread, that God is punishing us

because of a certain group of individuals they don't like. I totally agree with McCann that God is with us and for us, not against us.

What most interested me in the presentation was McCann's interpretation of Psalm 87 as a call to celebrate "the unity of the human community." That should be a lesson we've learned over the past two months - we belong to each other and <u>all</u> creation.

Some say the pandemic is "the great equalizer," but McCann said it is "the great revealer" of class division and how disconnected we truly are to each other and the Earth. We need change and renewal, not a return to the way we were.

This had me thinking about a new ritual of passing the peace that will help us feel connected to one another while being six feet apart, and to everyone else around the world. It will also remind us every week of our call to be intentional in working for peace, God's shalom. Shalom is a Hebrew word translated as peace but with a richer meaning of harmony extending to all creation.

Here is my idea. After the Assurance of Pardon we will do a "peace wave" followed by singing *Let There Be Peace on Earth.* 

Let there be peace on earth, and let it begin with me; Let there be peace on earth, the peace that was meant to be. With God as our Father, We are family. Let us walk with each other in perfect harmony.

Let peace begin with me, let this be the moment now. With ev'ry step I take, let this be my solemn vow: To take each moment and live each moment in peace eternally. Let there be peace on earth, and let it begin with me.

Because of copyright restrictions, we will have to wait until Pentecost, when we are no longer live streaming, to sing it. I look forward to that day and hope you do too.

In a recent letter of appreciation, Matthew Stevens, Director of Congregational Giving at Church World Service, thanked us for helping in the pandemic through our past support of the Blanket program.
