

**JUNE 2020** 

Monday was an anxiety filled day for me. The large bold headline on the front page of the *Sandusky Register* read, "Rage in America." It talked about all the violent protesting and looting taking place across the country in reaction to the lynching of George Floyd in Minneapolis last week.

Then there were rumors on the street that an outside group was coming to town that afternoon to stir up trouble at a protest/march scheduled to take place downtown in the afternoon. Supposedly, churches were going to be "targeted." Local pastors were urged to come to an early morning gathering to pray for God's protection. Some business closed early.

I firmly stand in solidarity with our black brothers and sisters in protesting Floyd's death and the countless atrocities that have been afflicted on people of color for over 400 years. However, the looting and destruction that is taking place leaves me baffled. Having participated in the Women's March on Washington with a million people, as well as several other peaceful demonstrations, I've struggled to understand what is going on. A friend's post on facebook was helpful.

He said, "We can't judge the real purpose, intent, and goals of the masses of people in the streets, who are trying to get justice - by making the mistake of including the criminals and 'agitators' who are acting only for self-gain and racial agitation. Looting is NOT protesting. Looters represent no one but themselves. As we watch the protests day and night, we can separate out the real righteous protestors, from the criminals taking advantage of the situation, from the 'partygoers' out to have fun."

As it turned out, Sandusky did us proud. Our protest was as it should be, a peaceful, organized march. There are two lessons here: 1) Remember the words of my friend. Every violent riot you see on the media probably has at its core a group of peaceful protestors who had their purpose hijacked by outside agitators and looters. Don't judge everyone by the misdeeds of some. 2) Don't believe everything you hear from others. Check things out before you end up spreading rumors and inciting fear and panic. If you can't verify something, <u>don't</u> pass it on. Shalom, Rev. Lenore

### SAFETY GUIDELINES FOR WORSHIP

# **How About A Longest Day Service?**

In light of the fact that all our usual summer community activities have been cancelled, a suggestion has been made that we hold a Celebration of Creation service on Saturday, June 20<sup>th</sup>, literally the longest day of the year. Similar to our Longest Night Service in December, it would include scripture, reflection and music. Like that service, it would most likely not attract a big crowd so social distancing in the sanctuary would be possible. Details have yet to be worked out, depending on comments and suggestions from the congregation. Please let Rev. Lenore know what you think.

# **Research & Exploration Team**

We met on May 27<sup>th</sup> and discussed new ideas as well as revisited our discussion on previous topics. The first discussion was about the storefront option in the Sandusky Plaza. It is immediately available, fully handicap accessible, with plenty of off street parking and a location we could make our own. However, in the long run, monthly costs would be more than we really wanted to spend. There was discussion on how some people prefer a more traditional church setting as well. However, once our items go into the location, it would be all First Congregational United Church of Christ.

We discussed the tour of a church for sale on the corner of Central Ave. and Tyler St. that several of us took. This location was not handicap accessible at all with steep staircases throughout, loads of maintenance and repairs needed, as well as very little parking. This is not going to work for us.

Joy had double checked on two previously discussed churches and came up with no new results. The Wedding Chapel is not willing to rent, and if anything, they would only sell and it would cost about the same as we are asking for our building. She also checked on Resurrection Lutheran Church. The owner did not respond to her inquiry so it appears they are not interested.

Joy asked if we had looked into space sharing with the Presbyterian Church. We hadn't, so she said she will see if that is an option.

Space sharing seems to be more cost effective, however we would need to work out the kinks of coexisting, time sharing of both groups, and ability to work out the differences in denominations and keep our uniqueness and our ONA.

We will meet again June 23, 2020 @ 6:45 p.m. unless we are notified there is a need to move up the next meeting. We need to start thinking about our "best option(s)" to present to the congregation and the pro's and con's of the top 2 or 3 locations.
