CHRISTMAS FUND SPECIAL MISSION OFFERING



They came when you needed them. They answered the phone when you called. They baptized and married and buried your loved ones. They gave up weekend after weekend after weekend to care for your spirit, lead you in worship, and point to God in your midst.

Some of them did it for less money than they could easily live on. Some of them did it for less than they would have been willing to do any other job for, because of what they believe about who God is, and what they believe about who *you* are.

For all the sacrifices that clergy and lay church workers have made in our congregations, over 100 years ago the Pension Boards of the United Church of Christ created the **Christmas Fund for the Veterans of the Cross and the Emergency Fund**, to help support them in retirement and during times of emergent need. This year's theme, "In Such a Time as This," is taken from

Esther 4:14 and reflects the urgent need of some lower income retirees during the pandemic.

We will take an offering for this fund on December 20th, but you may use the enclosed envelope to make your donation any time during the month.

The Christmas Fund provides Supplementation of Small Annuities, Supplementation of Health Premiums, Emergency Grants, and Christmas "Thank You" Gift Checks for retirees and those facing unforeseen financial hardship.

The Center for Peace Through Understanding is in need of donations for its outreach to needy families and individuals, as well as to over 70 nursing home residents. Items needed (by December 6th) include: Christmas cards, non-perishable food items, individually wrapped candies & snacks, small battery operated candles, large print word puzzle books, adult coloring books, and any other small, inexpensive items you think older folks would enjoy. Monetary donations are also welcome. Checks should also be made out to the CPTU (it is its own non-profit, separate from the church) and put in the offering basket or sent to the church.

ADVENT 2020

Advent is the time when we prepare our hearts and minds for celebrating the birth of Jesus. The Advent Season began the last Sunday in November when Nette & Kathie Simon lit the first candle on our Advent wreath. Four candles (three purple and one pink) are arranged on the wreath. Purple reminds us of the royalty of Jesus and the penitential nature of the season. Pink symbolizes joy. A fifth candle, placed in the center of the wreath, is the Christ Candle.

December 13 Lighting the Candle of Joy

December 20 Lighting the Candle of Peace
