According to Church tradition, the Magi (Wise Men) arrived to worship the Christ child 12 days after his birth. Actually, it may have taken them almost two years to get there, but we will celebrate their arrival on Sunday, January 3rd, although the official date is January 6th. That's when we'll hear their story, as recorded in Matthew 2:1-12. For us the celebration is called Epiphany, but in Hispanic and Latin culture, as well as some places in Europe, it is known as Three Kings' Day.

Epiphany marks the end of the Advent/Christmas Season and the Twelve Days of Christmas. The word "epiphany" is derived from the Greek word epiphaneia, meaning "an appearance," but over the centuries it has come to mean a shocking or surprising revelation of God in our lives.

The surprising revelation for the Magi was finding the newborn king in a lowly stable, not a royal palace. God had come to walk and talk among the people in the most unexpected way, as a baby born in a manger. The visit of the Magi itself was a surprising revelation for the first followers of Christ, who were Jewish. Because of this revelation of the Christ child to the Magi, who were Gentiles (non-Jews), it was clear that Jesus came for ALL people. That same revelation is the foundation of our church's mission, "embracing all God's children."

Following worship on January 3rd we will "undecorate" the church. "Many hands make the work light", so please stay and help.
