Those who are fully vaccinated can even hug one another once again. What a joyous day it will be! I hope you will be here.

In our joy we must not forget all those who have lost a loved one during the past 12 months. Pray they will find comfort in the blessing of eternal life that comes to us through the Resurrection. Jesus said, *"I am the resurrection and the life. Those who believe in me, even though they die, will live, and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die."* John 11:25-26
