


My understanding is that they will leave the sanctuary as a sanctuary, using it for weddings and as a venue for concerts and special programs. There will be

At the Church Life Meeting April 13th the following topics were discussed.

<u>Financial Matters</u>: While unpledged giving was up in March, the pledged giving was down. The first quarter giving statements are to go out soon with notes on those who are behind in their pledges asking them to please try to catch up.

Until we are able to investigate other investment opportunities, the bulk of the money from the sale of the old building will go in our current Endowment Fund. Approximately \$3000 will remain in the checking account. This will be earmarked for the painting.

<u>Painting:</u> Robin and Patsy will meet with the painter to choose the colors for the sanctuary and fellowship room. The Peace Room will be the same color as the offices. After the sanctuary is painted it will be decided whether or not we want a chair rail.

<u>Rentals:</u> The 11th Step Group will resume meeting weekly in May on Thursdays at noon. An Al-Anon group will begin renting from us for their weekly meetings in September.

<u>Organ Purchase:</u> Members have been asking when we will be getting an organ. It is hoped that Charles will be making a decision soon now that finances are less strained with the sale of the old building. In the meantime, we have another piano. It was donated by St. Paul Lutheran Church.

<u>Lawsuit</u>: Not much progress has been made with the lawsuit as our attorney has been attending to his ailing father in Florida. He will be checking in with his partner in Columbus, who will be handling the case, and get back to Rev. Lenore

The next Church Life Meeting will be May 11th at 6:00 p.m.. It is open to all church members with a willingness to help with minor decision making.
