In two weeks it will 25 years since I started my pastorate at First Congregational. It's hard for me to believe that much time has passed since I first stepped into the pulpit. But then I think about how much has changed in the Church, the community and society as a whole during that time, and reality kicks in.

Unfortunately, the Church has lost its influence in the community. (I'm talking about the universal church and the country, not just our congregation and Sandusky,

Ohio.) I was reminded of that when we received sign-up information for the downtown 4th of July celebration. I immediately called the organizer, sure a typo had been made in the paperwork - it was scheduled for Sunday, starting at 10:00 a.m.. I thought is was a rule that if the 4th fell on a Sunday, the celebration would be held on Saturday or Monday. (It has been in the past.)

I was told there was no such rule, the celebration committee had simply extended a courtesy to the churches in the past by scheduling around Sunday. They decided not to do that this year, apparently not concerned that some churches would not be able to participate. (We will miss it for the first time since I have been here.)

I guess I shouldn't be surprised, after all, the latest statistics indicate that only 47% of Americans say they belong to a church, synagogue or mosque. During the pandemic, 32% of these folks have stopped attending church altogether, virtually or in person.

So what should we do now that we are in the minority and apparently of little significance in society? I suppose we could throw up our hands and give up. However, I think a better idea is to try harder than ever to share with others the importance of the church in our lives and invite them to join us in worship. A couple of members have done that over the past few months, blessing us with visitors who attend regularly. What about the rest of you? Are you willing to do likewise?

What about those who have "ghosted" us the past year? We are now settled into our new location. Worship is safe and we are the same warm, welcoming congregation we always were. It's time to come back and join this small, but mighty congregation witnessing to the importance of Jesus Christ in our lives, the community and the world.

At the Church Life Meeting June 8th the following topics were discussed.

<u>Fund raising</u>: Several ideas were discussed. Rev. Lenore will check into the Kroger Community Rewards program. Once we know what is involved, the information will be shared in the newsletter and people will be helped to sign up after worship one Sunday.

<u>Wedding Rentals:</u> A wedding rental contract was written for our new location and the need for a wedding manager was discussed. It was also decided to buy blinds for the Conference Room windows to provide privacy for the bridal party as they get ready. This would also be good for movie night.

<u>Open House & Anniversary Celebration:</u> After much discussion it was decided to have Rev. Lenore's anniversary celebration and an open house on the same day with a meal fund raiser in-between the two events. A date will be selected based on the availability of the caterer, possibly Bones Boyz.

<u>Becoming a W.I.S.E. congregation.</u> Rev. Lenore talked about what this would involve. It is a 10-step process that could take up to three years. The first step is forming a committee made up of both church members and non-members (all people who have an interest in reaching out to those with mental health issues).

<u>Pastor's office furniture:</u> Rev. Lenore worked with Hilty Office Supply to furnish her office and to get a supply cabinet for the church office. Her mother's memorial money will partially cover the furniture expense and she will pay the rest herself.

<u>Storage:</u> We need to find a place to store the 10 boxes of historical information previously kept in the pastor's office. All three of our storage areas will need to be cleaned and organized to do this. We will begin with the custodian's closet, then the kitchen storage room and finally the main storage area. Volunteers will be needed.
