The babies and moms are all doing well. Congratulations everyone!


# 11<sup>™</sup> Step Group Changes Meeting Day

Unfailing Love is this year's theme for the Neighbors in Need offering, which we will receive on October 17<sup>th</sup>. This special offering supports the UCC's ministries of justice and compassion throughout the United States. Envelopes for your donation that day, or anytime in October, are located on the table in the sanctuary where the hymnals are.

Two-thirds of the offering is used by the UCC's Justice and Witness Ministries to fund a wide array of local and national justice initiatives, advocacy efforts, and direct service projects.

Through ucc.org/justice, our national Justice and Witness Ministries office offers resources, news updates, and action alerts on a broad spectrum of justice issues. Working with members of the UCC Justice and Peace Action Network (a network of thousands of UCC justice and peace advocates), Justice and Witness continues its strong policy advocacy work on issues such as the federal budget, voting rights, immigration, health care, hate crimes, civil liberties, and environmental justice.

Neighbors in Need also supports our American Indian neighbors in the UCC. One-third of the offering supports the UCC's Council for American Indian Ministries (CAIM). Historically, forebears of the UCC established churches and worked with Lakota, Dakota, Nakota, Mandan, Hidatsa, Arickara, and Hocak in North and South Dakota, Wisconsin, and northern Nebraska. Today there are 20 UCC congregations on reservations and one urban, multi-tribal UCC congregation in Minneapolis, Minnesota. These churches and their pastors are supported by CAIM. CAIM is also an invaluable resource for more than 1,000 individuals from dozens of other tribes and nations who are members of other UCC congregations in the U.S.

Everyone pitched in to get things set up and brought treats. All seemed happy to be together and many mingled after the services. Each of the missions chosen by the speakers will receive \$80. It was decided to hold the services again next year.

An organ committee has now been formed (Rev.Lenore, Robin and Charles.) The first meeting went well and hopefully it won't take long to come to a decision as to what type of organ to purchase. Important note: since then Charles has come to a decision about what organ to purchase. He says the sound is outstanding! However, there is a parts issue so we are on a waiting list for delivery. Hopefully the new organ will be in place for the holidays.
