I think our reluctance to embrace this season of planned giving stems from the tradition most churches have of linking giving with meeting the upcoming budget. We are encouraged to give generously so we can cover next year's expenses. Who gets excited about paying bills? I sure don't.

But I do get excited about "thanksliving," my word for living a life of gratitude to God for the many blessings I have received, and for the assurance I have that God is always with me, even during those times when life seems anything but blessed. I try to live out my thanks by giving generously of my time, talent and treasure. This takes me beyond just saying "thank you" in a prayer, or giving to the church out of a sense of responsibility to pay my share of the bills <u>and</u> brings me great joy!

It's no secret that I tithe, giving 10% of my income, and urge you to do likewise, but I know how difficult it is to begin such disciplined giving. So I suggest you make tithing your long-term goal and slowly move toward it by increasing your giving each year.

I'd be happy to talk with you about your giving, if you wish, but be warned, you might get help similar to that of the man in this story: A businessman came to his pastor seeking help in determining what to pledge for the upcoming year. "I have always tithed 10% of my income," he said. "When I first started working I only made \$50 a week, but gave \$5 to the church. When I became more successful and my income increased to \$500, I gave \$50. But now that I'm making \$5000 a week, I just can't bring myself to give \$500 to the church every Sunday."

"I understand your dilemma. Let's pray over this," the pastor said. He then began, "Dear God, please make this man's weekly income \$500 a week so he can tithe..."

<u>September's fund raiser.</u> Everyone agreed the Chicken Dinner was a wonderful success with a profit of \$2600 thanks to Tracey Kerston's generosity in donating the food and her time. Next time we will be paying her, so in order to reach our goal of \$2000 for fund raising for the year, we will need to have two dinners. A ham dinner in the spring was suggested.

<u>Contacting absent members.</u> A letter and return, postage-paid post card was approved to be sent to members we haven't seen since we moved. They will be asked if they plan to be active in the new year or want to be removed from our membership list.

<u>New Organ.</u> The organ company informed Charles they may receive a shipment early - mid-December. Since it was hoped to have the organ in place by mid-November, he will be asked to check out e-bay and other companies to see if they have what he wants and can get it to us sooner.

<u>Stewardship Campaign.</u> The materials have been ordered. Rev. Lenore will write the stewardship letter. Scarlet is recruiting speakers. Several names were suggested.

<u>Promoting the Church next year</u>. The possibility of renting billboard space was discussed, as well as advertising in the *Serving Our Seniors* magazine.

<u>Handicap Accessibility.</u> We need to make improvements to the curb and parking lot area in front of the building for the safety of our handicapped members. Ths will be a priority for next year's budget.

<u>Christmas Banners.</u> The decision was made to purchase two new banners for Christmas. Glenn & Robin will pick them out.



# **HAPPY NEW (CHURCH) YEAR!**

Do you pay attention to this poster of the Church Year on the bulletin board in the church entranceway? If so, you are probably aware that on the first Sunday of Advent (November 28<sup>th</sup> this year) we begin a new Church Year. If not, check it out next time you are at church. You will learn a lot about the seasons of the Church and gain an understanding of when and why the color of the altar cloths changes periodically.

Christians around the world and throughout history have shaped their faith and marked their lives by the days and seasons of the Church Year. The Church Year revolves around three great festival days - Christmas, Easter and Pentecost - and the seasons that connect them - Advent, Christmas, Epiphany, Lent and Pentecost or Ordinary Time.



Each season has its own color and theme. We begin with Advent (purple), which is the four weeks before Christmas, ending on Christmas Eve. Advent focuses on preparation for the coming of the Christ child. As part of a special ritual, each Sunday we light a candle in our brass Advent wreath in anticipation of his birth. First is the love candle. Then comes peace, joy and hope. On Christmas Eve we light the Christ candle in the center of the wreath. The next day the Christmas season begins.
