As we prepare for the birth of the Prince of Peace, I am excited to announce an event that the Center for Peace Through Understanding will be hosting in January with the Center for Cultural Awareness. Titled *Where's Your Peace?*, it will be a great opportunity to start the new year off right by figuring out how to find inner peace by balancing 12 areas of your life, including such things as self-care, stress mastery, spirituality and relationships.

Over 20 years ago I took a course based on a similar concept. It helped me assess my strengths and weakness and make changes in order to bring balance into my life. It also enabled me in the years since then to sense when I need to focus on a particular area in my life to regain balance.

For many months now I have been acutely aware that my level of stress is overshadowing my sense of well-being. A big factor, of course, is the COVID crisis. Add to that all the other stressors I have experienced over the past two years, like the death of my brother and mother, selling the old building and settling into the new location, a knee injury that caused me to move to a more accessible apartment, and you will understand why I told the Church Life group that it's time for me to take a sabbatical.

The term sabbatical is derived from the biblical Sabbath which meets the human need for rest and rejuvenation. In addition to simply taking a break, people often use a sabbatical to pursue an interest, fulfill a goal, or do research. I hope to finally finish writing the church history I began during my last sabbatical in 2004, and had hoped to complete by our 200th anniversary.

My contract allows me a three-month sabbatical every five years. In my 25 years at the church, I've only taken one! I will begin my leave at the very end of January and return on Holy Humor Sunday (April 24th). Meanwhile, you will be in the capable hands of Rev. Bob, who has graciously agreed to fill in for me while I am gone. Fortunately, after my last sabbatical, we began saving for the next one, so we have the funds to pay him.

I know no one really likes the idea of me being gone for three months, but trust me, it is necessary. Hopefully, you will use the time we are apart to reflect on our future and how we can expand our mission and ministry. I promise to come back to you rested, refreshed and ready to hit the ground running with your ideas.

Glenn will supervise the <u>decorating</u> as we transition from fall to the Christmas season. Kathy Hunscke will pick up the poinsettias to have them in place for the December 19th worship service.

A <u>congregational meeting</u> to approve the budget was scheduled for December 19th after worship. The <u>Annual Meeting</u> will be January 23rd after worship.
